


They were assisted by Scouts John Werner, 1124 Matilda Street, and Mike Doerner, 100 West Lawson Avenue, both of Troop 66.

He volunteered his services to the Jaycees, Boy Scouts of America, Church, Toastmasters, Salvation Army, and the Simpson Shelter. He was recognized with

the Viking Community Award during a Minnesota Vikings halftime presentation. He served as a District Governor in Toastmasters and he was awarded the Toastmaster International Presidential Citation. In Boy Scouting, he was honored with the Silver Beaver Award for a life time of service.



Dear Friends:

I'm glad to have an opportunity to close out my arc at the North Star Museum of Boy Scouting and Girl Scouting with a personal message to all of you.

Thank you. Just thank you.

My time at the Museum was very, very important to me, both professionally, and personally. I learned a lot about my skills, which really lean more towards people and collections, rather than numbers, money, and management. I think everyone probably needs a job like that, in order to learn their limits (we all have them, and I seem to have more than lots of other people!).

But it is all of you that truly had the most impact on me. Had I not come to the North Star Museum, I would never have met such a great group of individuals, the vast majority of whom would never have crossed my path. It has been such a true pleasure to get to know you, work with you, and in many cases, watch your young people grow up. I treasure the friendships that I gained in the nearly fourteen years I was with you, and I will be devastated if I cannot keep up my relationship you.

There are, as we have all found out, lots of things that I don't know. But, there is one thing that I do know, and it is this: the North Star Museum of Boy Scouting and Girl Scouting is a treasure. And it has treasure in its collection. If you are not aware, the Museum was founded by a group of Scouters, friends, really, from the East Side of St. Paul. These men did their Boy Scouting together over decades, and when they founded the Museum, they populated the collection with their personal stuff. Ask a historian—material created over decades by a group of people who knew each other and worked together is gold. It is the kind of collection that allows historians to tease out the real history—the history that you are creating every day in your work with youth in your communities.

Let's all work together to ensure that all kids in Girl Scouting and Boy Scouting in this region know the history of their programs and can draw inspiration and strength from the stories of their peers in the past.

I will miss the Museum a great deal, but it was time for me to move on. I have started a museum consulting business and have some exciting projects happening right now. I hope not to be a stranger. And I hope above all, that I continue to meet you in the community or wherever you are.
