The Collections Committee reformed in May 2022 and Becca joined the committee. Becca familiarized herself with the Museum's collections policy and worked with other committee members to ensure that they understood the policy and the Museum's collection protocol. She also taught committee members and volunteers how to use the Past Perfect Web software to create the necessary database structure required to track existing and newly accessioned items. Becca's spent

several hundred hours on these efforts. For bringing order to chaos and her work righting the Museum's collections ship, Becca was honored as Skunk of the Year. Congratulations!

Following a moment of silence for the Skunks we lost in the past year and the singing of Scout Vespers, the meeting concluded. All those in attendance enjoyed a box lunch and more social time.
